A REPORT ON THE NOVEMBER OASIS AUCTION

On Sunday 5th November, OASIS held their annual winter Auction at the Redhouse Community Centre, Sunderland. We were a little down on attendees when compared to the number of people who were with us in 2022. We were also slightly down on 'lots', but the eight vendors who would enter their wares brought along a wonderful variety of fish and aquatic items. Andy Flinn of NETS was the Auctioneer.

Among the catfish for sale were some excellent quality *Synodontis albolineatus* and *S. petricola*, of both the natural and pink colour forms. I was taken with some Rusty Corydoras, *Corydoras rabauti*, but resisted their purchase. Many members of the audience would be taken with some amazing Green Dragon Bristlenose (a line-bred form of *Ancistrus* in which the body is covered in grey and black spots that are outlined in an olive colouration) so these made a good price for the seller. Some strange looking Bulldog Plecs. also caught the eye.

If we group the other fish that I liked into one grouping then we would have the strange mix of Green Dragon *Betta splendens*, Black Sharks, various Guppies, Blue Phantom Tetra, Clown Loach, various Endlers, Dumbo *Betta splendens* and Ram Cichlids.

Along with the fish side of things, would be a large and amazing selection of aquatic items that included heating units, small tanks, LED lighting units, various gravels and filter accessories.

To accompany the Auction, the Beach family had a trade stand selling various types of fish foods and aquatic accessories.

I had a really enjoyable afternoon and will give a quick reminder that the next OASIS Auction will be held, at the same venue, on Sunday 18th February.

On Sunday 12th November, the Bradford and District A.S. held their Winter Auction at Bradford Academy. Firstly, a big thank you to anyone who came and helped in any way on the day and especially those who helped with the running of the event.

It seemed that the odds were stacked against us when our planned Auctioneer let us know, on the day of the event, that he was unable to attend. To add to this, it was an exceptionally cold day weather wise. But we coped. Club members had arrived at 9 am to help make up the sandwiches, butter tea cakes, peel boiled eggs, slice onions and tomatoes, put fillings into the tea cakes and place the pre-made sandwiches into plastic sandwich bags. The fantastic array of cakes and buns had been made the day before. All done to make buying lunch at the Auction a reasonably priced and satisfying experience. We know the pies were a bit on the small side but we had difficulty getting any at an affordable price

Admission was £1 - and that entitled you to a free draw later in the afternoon to win a box of chocolates. Seventy-three attendees paid to come in. Those with an auction 'lot' do not pay an entry fee. There were 15 'lots', so with sellers and public and our own members there was about a hundred people in the hall.

Ian Wallbridge stepped up to do the auctioneering, with his son Zac being promoted to auctioneer's assistant. There were plants, fish, tanks and a selection of dry goods and equipment. There are clubs who only accept fish and plants but we have continued to sell anything. If there are buyers wanting bags of bits then we will sell them. As the pace of the Auction was fast you had to be quick to snap up that item you wanted otherwise it was gone. A breeding group of albino *Corydoras* seemed to be the deal of the day?

An added attraction was the raffle conducted by Dave Tetley - all prizes were claimed.

Our next Open Event is sort of pencilled in for May or June 2024 and hopefully we may be able to incorporate at least a Mini-Open Show as well?

For years we have put on a decent café at reasonable prices. The price of the food we sell has remained more or less the same for many years but next time we feel we will need to put the prices up to cover the costs of the goods we have to buy. Another idea is to ask people to bring, and use, their own mugs for tea and coffee to cut out the need to pay for single use polystyrene or paper cups - your opinion is welcome

Overall, despite the early setbacks, our Winter Auction was a very successful day Thanks again to all who came.
